Welcome!

Welcome to the **Linguistics Language Program**, a unit of the Department of Linguistics at UC San Diego. We offer basic instruction in American Sign Language, Arabic, French, German, Italian, Portuguese, and Spanish, in five heritage languages (Cantonese, Filipino, Hindi, Persian, and Vietnamese), and in over 60 other languages in our independent study program.

Course goals

Conversation and **Analysis** are two halves of one course and need to be taken together. Both are designed to immerse you in the language and give you a practical ability as quickly as possible. The two halves are together worth **5 units**, so you should expect a heavier workload than a typical 4-unit class.

Conversation (MWF) is a smaller class, with special attention to personal interaction, vocabulary, and culture.

Analysis (TuTh) is a larger class, with special attention to comprehension and learning how to analyze the language and the culture.

Your instructors

You will have one instructor for Conversation and another instructor for Analysis. Both are supervised by the Academic Coordinator for German. You can find contact information for all these people at the Canvas site for this course.

Course expectations

What you can expect from us:

- A rich language-learning environment: Learning a language requires lots of meaningful input and interaction. Our courses are designed to give you exactly that, during both in-class and outof-class activities.
- A supportive, welcoming, and inclusive classroom: Learning a language should be fun, and we strive to make our classes an enjoyable place to learn for <u>all</u> our students.
- A committed and dedicated staff: We have one main goal: giving you the most effective language-learning experience possible. Your success is our success, and we do everything possible to make sure you finish your course sequence with a practical ability in the language that you will be able to use for the rest of your life.

- **Dedication**: We give you the best language-learning environment possible and the means to make use of that environment. The rest is up to you. The more time you put in, the more you will learn.
- Enthusiasm: Many of our classes are small and personal, and you will get to know your teachers and classmates well. You owe it to them to show up ready and eager to participate.

Course learning outcomes

At the end of this course, you will be able to use strings of sentences to perform routine communicative tasks in many social situations. This includes:

- exchanging basic information about work, school, and recreation
- discussing topics of particular interest to you
- describing a series of events or giving a series of instructions

Your ability to comprehend will generally be greater than your ability to produce. You will be able to comprehend the main ideas and supporting details in longer-format contexts containing multiple sentences, as in a story.

This level of ability in the language corresponds roughly to **Intermediate High** in the proficiency guidelines of the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages or to **B1** in the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

Beyond the above proficiency outcomes, this course will increase your ability to:

- Use the language in its cultural context, taking into account relevant historical, political, economic and social information.
- Understand the structural properties of the language, how these compare to English, and how these are reflective of properties of human language in general.
- Observe yourself as you acquire the language, reflect on this experience, and make the experience as fruitful as possible.
- Observe and analyze your own culture from the perspective of the other culture.

A student who fails either Conversation or Analysis (i.e. receives an F or NP) must retake that component before continuing to the next level of the sequence.

- be attentive and interested in what your fellow students and your instructor have to say.
- participate in class activities willingly, enthusiastically and voluntarily, with the goal of creating a lively and engaging learning environment for everyone in class.

Conversation 1D (M-W-F)

Details

- Vocabulary: You are responsible for learning both the vocabulary introduced in class and in the textbook. Your notebook and the vocabulary list at the end of the chapter will be the basis for weekly vocabulary guizzes (5 words).
- Compositions: In grading your composition, your instructor will take into consideration the use
 of vocabulary and grammar covered in class, organization, and creativity. Your instructor will
 read your composition and circle errors that you should be able to correct yourself. Make
 corrections and hand in the corrected composition to your instructor. Both versions of your
 compositions will be graded.
- Movies: This quarter's movies, Good-bye Lenin and Im Juli will give you an authentic listening
 and viewing experience in German. Please watch the movie before week 2 and 9 respectively,
 (Your teacher will give you access to the films). You will have a written assignment for the
 movie and should be prepared to discuss the movie in class.
- **Oral presentation:** There will be one oral presentation 5-7 minutes long on a cultural topic or a topic on which you are an expert. Your instructor will approve your topic for the class presentation. You may use notes, but you should not memorize or read the report. You are encouraged to use slides, props, handouts, or other aids to make your presentations livelier.
- Conversation Final: The Conversation final exam is an individual 15-minute conversation with your instructor (which may be taped). Sign up in class in week 10 for an appointment during finals week. The final cannot be taken earlier. Your instructor will judge the final for comprehension, content, vocabulary, fluency, grammar, and pronunciation.

Grammar Study: We will use the light-blue-colored pages in the textbook for grammar reference and practice. In addition, there will be materials posted on the class Canvas site. Please print these materials and bring them to class.

Midterm Examinations: There will be two reading/grammar midterms. They will be given in class on Thursday of week 4 and Tuesday of week 8

Homework: At the end of each textbook chapter, please complete the exercises assigned in Connect German. The chapter exercises are required while LearnSmart is optional practice. Deadlines are in Connect. Your score will be reduced by 10% for each day late.

Video (*Kontakte*): The purpose of the video is to increase your ability to understand spoken German, and to have exposure to the culture. The videos will be shown in class. At times, they will be used for grammar analysis.

Reading: The purpose of the assignments is to increase your ability to read narration in German WITHOUT translating to English, and to participate in class discussion. Readings will also be used for analysis of grammatical structures.
